PRE-CONFERENCE SEMINAR ABSTRACTS

PCS 1-A – Associated in Risk Management (ARM) -54 Preparation Class-Risk Assessment - Mary Stewart

The new ARM program teaches the in-depth knowledge needed to assess and respond to the numerous hazard risks your company faces. ARM helps employees to:

- Build a strong foundation in the science of risk management
- Gain practical skills to avoid, reduce, and manage risk
- Learn to adapt those skills to meet changing needs

This session reviews the following: Establishing Risk Management Programs; The Risk Management Process; Legal Foundations of Liability Loss Exposures; Assessing Property, Liability, Personnel, and Net Income Loss Exposures; Management Liability and Corporate Governance; Forecasting Losses; and Cash Flow Analysis.

Attendees can take any combination of the three ARM Preparation Classes – ARM-54 (PCS-1A), ARM-55 (PCS-1B) and ARM-56 (PCS-1C).

PRE-CONFERENCE SEMINAR ABSTRACTS

PCS 1-B – Associated in Risk Management (ARM) -55 Preparation Class - Risk Control - Mary Stewart

This session reviews the following: Controlling Property, Personnel, Liability, and Net Income Loss Exposures; Intellectual Property Loss Exposures; Criminal Loss Exposures; Disaster Recovery for Property Loss Exposures; Understanding Claim Administration; Fleet Operations Loss Exposures; Environmental Loss Exposures; Understanding System Safety; Motivating and Monitoring Risk Control Activities.

PCS 1-C – Associated in Risk Management (ARM) -56 Preparation Class- Risk Financing - Mary Stewart

This session reviews the following: Understanding Risk Financing; Insurance as a Risk Financing Technique; Insurance Plan Design; Reinsurance and Self-Insurance; Retrospective Rating Plans; Captive Insurance Plans; Finite and Integrated Risk Insurance Plans; Capital Market Risk Financing Plans; Forecasting Accidental Losses; Self-Insurance Plans; and Purchasing Insurance and Other Risk Financing Services and Risk Financing Needs.

PCS 2 - Construction Health and Safety Technician (CHST) Preparation Class - Bruce Donato, CSP, CHMM

This is a review and preparation course for personnel preparing to take Board of Certified Safety Professionals Construction Health and Safety Technician examination. In three days participants will review CHST education and experience requirements and over two hundred questions addressing the nine areas to be covered by the exam. This course is unique in its customized math preparation section and review of OSHA recordkeeping requirements. It also has participants become familiar with resources available to prepare for the exam. Upon completion of the workshop, participants should be able to identify their strengths as well as areas where further study may be required. Included in the price is the SPAN preparation workbook and an approved calculator. You can also purchase an optional practice question CD at a discounted rate.

PCS 3(A) –CPR/AED Certification Course - Pete Holzberg

If you were confronted with a medical emergency, would you know how to give adequate treatment? This hands-on training prepares participants to respond to medical emergencies in adults using CPR and the safe use of an automated external defibrillator (AED). Upon completion of this training, participants will receive a certificate of completion that is valid for 2 years.

PCS 4 -OSHA 10 Hour Course for General Industry - John Lanigan

The 10-hour General Industry Outreach Training Program is intended to provide an entry level general industry worker broad awareness on recognizing and preventing hazards on a general industry site. The training covers a variety of safety and health hazards which a worker may encounter at a general industry site. OSHA recommends this training as an orientation to occupational safety and health. Workers must receive additional training on hazards specific to their job.

PCS 5 – Working with the Media - Dr. Robert Emery, DrPH, CHP, CIH, CSP, RBP, CHMM, CPP, ARM & James H. Morris, III

As many of us have likely seen, every organization needs a strong media strategy to survive. Whether it is promoting a service, responding to a crisis, or acting as an “expert,” knowing how the media works is crucial to effectively communicating your message. As members of a potentially volatile profession, we are often the ones our companies turn to for input, either directly or indirectly when the media comes calling. In this session, we will examine the various types of media, how they work, and what they want, and how you can use that information to effectively communicate what YOU want to communicate. We’ll also use some hands-on exercises to help you avoid some pitfalls and even traps that can happen when you’re the one in front of the microphone. You’ll also know the questions you should ask before the interview even starts. Upon completion of the session, attendees will have a better idea of what it’s like to work with the media, and will have an opportunity to watch themselves in the “hot seat.

PCS 6 – Near Miss (Close Call) Program - Paul Esposito, CIH, CSP, CPEA

Establishing a near miss or close call program is often one of the more difficult programs to implement. Typically people don’t want to admit to mistakes. Successful programs change the perception from one of reporting mistakes, to submitting suggestions. Where do these suggestions come from? How do you measure and reward? What does management do to either make this process successful? This presentation will discuss successful definitions and strategies, as well as present case studies of programs that worked.

PCS 7 – Contractor Safety - Adele Abrams, Esq., CMSP

One of the largest liability exposures companies and their managers - including safety professionals; have concerns about work performed by contractors and subcontractors. This in-depth session will explore OSHA and MSHA enforcement policies; standards that require coordination between the host employer/GC and subcontractors; prequalification techniques; liability issues in tort and worker’s compensation issues arising from auditing contractors, management of safety programs/systems at multi-employer worksites, and legally sound approaches to avoid litigation.

Common Violations – Guess the Outcome

Bob Emory,

In this session, we will virtually “walk” through a workplace setting and have an interactive inspection and review how evaluation of violation information relates to compliance performance. Overall EPA and OSHA compliance strategies will also be discussed. There will be audience participation and prizes will be awarded to those who can answer key questions.

This is sure to be a hot topic at the PDC.

Back to the Basics - Cranes

John Lanigan

This session references the most current crane report, the Center for Construction Research and Training Jan. 2009, Crane-Related Deaths in Construction researched and written by my friend Michael McCann, also Janie Gittleman and Mary Watters. Their report cites 632 crane related deaths from 1992 to 2006.

In this session, you will walk through the 29 CFR 1926 Crane standards, seeing what is required of the employer, crane operator, signal man and rigger. See one of a kind pictures that will jump start your new attitude.

Come see what it takes to keep crane operations in compliance, upright and profitable. See some extraordinary pictures of every sort of crane exposure. Cranes are the most expensive piece of equipment on the work site with the potential for the biggest financial exposure; the crane is also associated with the largest lost of life. You're not an operator, you're not involved in its use, but you are in charge and have the position of where the buck stops.

Office Ergonomics

David Brodie MS, CPE

Possessing the data to support purchase decisions and gain management approval is more important than ever before due to budget constraints. Identifying and introducing the best ergonomic solution for your workplace helps increase overall ROI. As ergonomics and safety decision makers continually push to improve safety, efficiency and productivity, a well thought out purchase plan, including supporting research to back up the purchase, can help get purchases approved. Once the decision has been made to purchase an ergonomic solution, the next step is determining which product is best for each employee.

NFPA 70E – Compliance

In this session, we will review: what NFPA 70E is and is not; 70E and OSHA; 2009 70E changes; 70E vs. NESC, and which standard applies; and Care & Maintenance Standards.

Do You Need A Risk Assessment Makeover

As a result of economic conditions many organizations instituted changes over the past two years, such as merging operations or eliminating safe practices. As a result most employers should re-evaluate all operations and conduct a full risk assessment. This session will offer helpful solutions to make your risk assessment makeover more effective.

Making Sense of Nanomaterials Part 1

Tracy Zontek, PhD, CSP

The explosive field of nanotechnology has provided both exciting applications and unresolved technical issues. For those who are performing research and development on these materials, controlling health risks may be problematic due to the lack of regulatory standards or guidelines, as well as the lack of standard analysis methodology. Additionally, the health hazards of nanosize particles vary by characteristics such as surface area, particle number, and/or solubility. This session will include a review of current regulatory guidance, air monitoring protocols, industrial hygiene sampling strategies, and control methodology for nanomaterials.

Arc Flash & PPE

Kevin Weidman

In this session, we will review: what is an arc flash; why you should care about arc flash; how flame-resistant clothing works; why flame-resistant clothing should be used; and flame-resistant clothing program options.

ABSTRACTS

GHS: It's Coming Sooner Than You Think... Are you Prepared?

Chuck Haling

Hazard Communication is one of the most frequently violated OSHA standards and with the agency getting tougher on enforcement, compliance is crucial. This presentation provides a brief overview of the regulation, touches on the impact of the proposed alignment with GHS and shares some easy-to-implement best practices for helping your organization meet OSHA's HCS requirements, including best practices for managing your written plan, providing proper employee training and utilizing efficient MSDS management systems.

OSHA's Here, What Do I do?

Christopher G. Hill, LEED AP

In this break out session Christopher Hill, LEED AP and construction attorney will cover the ethics and practical considerations relating to OSHA inspections and record keeping. Issues to be discussed are record keeping, audits and the steps necessary to properly prepare for an OSHA inspection, properly handle the day of the inevitable inspection, and keep workplaces safe.

Exposure Risks During Renovation/Demolition Projects

Chris Chapman, CIH

This program provides a general overview of common safety and health concerns that may be encountered during demolition or renovation projects. Developed with Project, Safety, Construction and Demolition Managers in mind, this program focuses primarily on issues of Hazardous Materials Abatement and General Safety and Site Security of Unstable Structures etc. By highlighting successfully mitigated hazardous conditions and utilizing visual examples of real world demolition projects, Chris seeks to educate by providing case studies which directly relate to existing Federal and State regulatory practices and explores the economic and procedural impacts of pending changes in regulatory law.

This session will explore the many approaches to developing and delivering adult training on the following topics: safety and health training perceptions; new employee orientation training; annual refresher training; communicating with the young and the experienced workforce; training formats for different objectives, and "to test or not to test".

What To Do When You are Called to Testify

Christopher Hill, LEED AP & Chris Chapman, CIH

This break out session will cover court preparation from the initial need to document one's activities through to cross examination during deposition or trial. Issues to be discussed will include document retention, risk management, proper demeanor, and trial preparation tips from the perspective of an attorney. The second part of the presentation will review from the point of view of the witness the dos and don'ts of actual testimony, what to say, what not to say, and how to say it correctly.

OSHA is Cracking Down on Recordkeeping: Are You Prepared?

Chuck Haling

With OSHA's renewed focus on Recordkeeping Rule, 29 CFR 1904, and enforcement, companies should waste no time getting their injury and illness records in order. The consequences for non-compliance are costly. This session provides a summary of the main components of the regulation, a breakdown of forms 300, 300A and 301, a review of recordable and non-recordable criteria and scenarios, and some actionable steps for achieving and maintaining compliance with the standard.

ABSTRACTS

Making Sense of Nanomaterials Part 2

A follow-up to Part 1, this session will include examples from the research and development environment demonstrating air monitoring and controls of nanomaterials, as well as all the real-life issues that emerge when taking theory to practice. The current air monitoring protocol for nanoscale materials, including advantages and disadvantages of equipment, sampling strategies, and reducing employee health hazards will be described based on several years of actual air sampling campaigns in the research and development environment.

Introducing the Safety Ambassador

In today's economy, one thing on which we can depend is we all have to do more with less. This course will introduce and describe how the Safety Ambassador concept has worked successfully in a heavy manufacturing environment. You will leave the course with all the tools necessary to implement a Safety Ambassador program at your company.

Workers' Comp Essentials
